Match background

Having accounted for Besiktas JK in the round of 16, unbeaten Club Brugge KV will look to forge on to the UEFA Europa League semi-finals at the expense of FC Dnipro Dnipropetrovsk.

Previous meetings

- The teams have met once before, Yevgen Kucherevskyy's Dnipro coming from 2-1 down to beat Trond Sollied's side 3-2 in Dnipropetrovsk in a 2004 UEFA Cup group game – Dnipro's only previous encounter with Belgian opponents. Dnipro ultimately finished top of the section; Club Brugge bowed out.

 Club Brugge have won three of their 11 games against Ukrainian clubs, but are without a success in the most recent seven of those fixtures (D4 L3).

Form guide

- Club Brugge are the only unbeaten side left in the competition and have won
 their last five matches, with the record W11 D3 since entering this season's
 competition in the third qualifying round. By contrast Dnipro have lost four
 matches since the start of the group stage as many as they have won and
 have won only one of their seven European away games this season (W1 D3
 L3).
- Club Brugge are in the quarter-finals for the first time since the advent of the UEFA Cup and UEFA Europa League group stages. The Belgian side have not reached the latter stages of a UEFA tournament since they made it to the last four in the 1991/92 European Cup Winners' Cup, losing to SV Werder Bremen.
- Club Brugge have never lost a UEFA Cup/UEFA Europa League quarter-final, overcoming AC Milan in 1975/76 and Panathinaikos FC in 1987/88, winning both ties 3-2 on aggregate.
- Dnipro have reached the quarter-finals of this competition for the first time.
 Their biggest European successes were making it to the quarter-finals of the 1984/85 and 1989/90 European Champion Clubs' Cups.

Trivia and links

- With eight-goal top scorers Alan (FC Salzburg) and Romelu Lukaku (Everton FC) both eliminated, the top marksmen left in the competition are SSC Napoli's Gonzalo Higuain and Club Brugge's Lior Retaelov, with six goals each.
- Dnipro remain the most combative side in the competition, with 179 fouls committed (and 171 sustained) and have received 38 yellow cards 11 more than any other side.
- Dnipro's Czech defender Ondrej Mazuch played in Belgium with RSC Anderlecht (2009–11), with Club Brugge's Tom De Sutter one of his team-mates in Brussels.
- Dnipro's Yevhen Konoplyanka is the most fouled played in this season's competition by some distance. He has been impeded 36 times ten more than any other player.
- Due to extra time in the round of 16 decider, Dnipro goalkeeper Denys Boyko and defender Douglas have now played 930 minutes of football in this season's competition – 30 more than any other player.
- Club Brugge won their first trophy in eight years on 22 March, beating RSC Anderlecht 2-1 in a thrilling Belgian Cup final. Retaelov scored the late winner.
- Dnipro were initially drawn at home but the fixture was reversed according to the draw procedure as the first leg clashed with FC Dynamo Kyiv's home encounter with ACF Fiorentina.
- A goalkeeper for R. Standard de Liege, Mechelen, SL Benfica and Belgium, for whom he earned 58 caps, Michel Preud'homme has been in charge of Club Brugge since September 2013. As a coach, he has claimed league titles in Belgium (Standard, 2007/08) and Saudi Arabia (al-Shabab FC, 2011/12) in addition to the Belgian Cup (KAA Gent, 2009/10) and the Dutch Cup (FC Twente, 2010/11).
- Dnipro coach since May 2014, Myron Markevych started out as a midfielder with home-town club FC Karpaty Lviv. While his playing career was not a huge success, he served Karpaty in four spells as a coach before a lengthy stint at FC Metalist Kharkiv earned him a reputation for attacking football.

Matchday 12 (23/04/2015) FC Dnipro Dnipropetrovsk-Club Brugge KV Club Brugge Koninklijke Voetbalvereniging also referred to as just Club Brugge, is a football club based in Bruges in Belgium. It was founded in 1891 and its home ground is the Jan Breydel Stadium, which has a capacity of 29.472.

It has been Belgian champion on 13 occasions, second only to major rivals R.S.C. Anderlecht, and it shares the Jan Breydel Stadium with city rival Cercle Brugge K.S.V., with whom they contest the Bruges derby.

Throughout its long history, Club Brugge has enjoyed much European football success, reaching two European finals and two European semi-finals. Club Brugge is the only Belgian club to have played the final of the European Cup (forerunner of the current UEFA Champions League) so far, losing to Liverpool in the final of the 1978 season. They also lost in the 1976 UEFA Cup Final to the same opponents. Club Brugge holds the record number of consecutive participations in the UEFA Cup (16), the record number of Belgian cups (11) and the record number of Belgian Supercups (13).



1975: Olympiastadion They moved from Albert Dyserynckstadion to Olympiastadion (current Jan Breydelstadion).

1976: Highest position in UEFA Cup Under Austrian coach Ernst Happel, Club Brugge reached the finals of the UEFA Cup and lost against Liverpool (3–2 and 1–1).

1978: Only Belgian European Cup 1 finalists Still under Ernst Happel, the club faced Liverpool again of a European final. This time it was in the European Champions Clubs' Cup final. And again they lost (1–0). Club Brugge is the only Belgian club that have reached the finals of the European biggest competition.

1992: First goal scorer in the Champions League Daniel Amokachi is the first goal scorer in the Champions League. He scored against CSKA Moskva.

1963-1974: Two Belgian Cup wins and a League Title

With the departure of Norberto Hofling, the coach seat at Club Brugge saw many different faces in a relatively short time span. First there was Schwanner, who was then replaced by Henri Dekens, who in his turn was succeeded by Lucien Masynfor a short temp job - only to be replaced soon again by Louis Dupal. It was this Louis Dupal who laid the foundations for the great Club Brugge. He was like a father to the players, and with his team he managed to secure hith place in 1965-1966, and even the second spot one year later. At the end of that season, he made way for Norberto Hofling, who then started his second term at De Klokke.



In the meanwhile, it was becoming clear that the quality of the players was also getting better and better. With such outstanding players as Boone, Carteus, Lambert, Thio, Balliu, Marmenout, Savat, Vanderlinden, Simoens, Moelaert, Van den Daele, Hinderyckx, Loske, Bossaer, De Coninck and Deprez better times were ahead. With this group of players, throughout the years completed with a.o. Kurt Axelsson, Brian Hill, Stefan Reisch, Tom Turesson, Alfons Bastijns, Robby Rensenbrink, Henk Houwaert, Luc Sanders, and many others, Club Brugge found its way to the top of Belgian club football, only to stay there permanently.

European Cup football reached De Klokke for the first time in the season 1967-1968, in the form of a game against Sporting Lissabon and the boys in blue and black finished second in the home league again. 1968 turned out to be quite successful, as Club also won its first Belgian Cup. They met Beerschot in the Cup Final, and drew 1-1, but after two series of penalty shootouts, Club managed to clinch the deal. Another Belgian Cup would be added to its trophy cabinet in 1970, when Club, led by coach Frans De Munck, repeated the 1968 achievement and won the cup again.

1973 saw the absolute triumph in the first division, as Club won its second league title under the leadership of coach Leo Canjels. It had taken 53 long years of waiting for the blue and black army to reach the number one spot again.


Some Club Brugge players did so well that they were also selected for Belgium's Red Devils and soon became household names in the Belgian selection. Fernand Boone, Johny Thio, Pierre Carteus, Raoul Lambert and Erwin Van den Daele are living proof as they were all regularly capped for the Belgian national team.

Fernand Boone

Fernand Boone was the unquestionable starting goalkeeper of the blue and black Great Old for almost 19 seasons (1953-1972). At the age of 33, he became the first person from West-Flanders to win the Gouden Schoen/Golden Boot, Belgian tootball's most coveted prize, in 1967. He also holds 12 caps for the national squad.
